# CENTREVILLE HIGH SCHOOL WILDCAT BANDS <br> - 2014-2015 HANDBOOK • 

WELCOME to the band program at Centreville High School. This information is provided to assist you in understanding the program. It is the mission of the Centreville High School Wildcat Bands to provide a structured environment for learning the fundamentals and value of music through performance in Band. We strive to help students achieve at their highest possible level, and we will work to instill a sense of selfconfidence, cooperation, respect for self and others and musical integrity in every aspect of performance. Most importantly, Band students will learn that they are a part of an organization where dedication and accountability to the group is the key, not only for individual success, but also for the Band as a whole. Self-discipline in instrumental music is the key to many learning experiences that will enrich the life of every individual.

Please read all of the information in this packet so you have a clear understanding of the program and its expectations.

## I. The Program:

WIND ENSEMBLE Class is designed to optimize the potential, talent and musicality of the advanced instrumental musician through the rehearsal and performance of quality wind band literature. Musical, historical and theoretical concepts are discussed and applied to every piece of music to a degree appropriate for the development of advanced musicianship. Marching band is a requirement (co-requisite) for this course.

SYMPHONIC BAND Class is designed to develop the potential instrumental musician through the rehearsal and performance of quality wind band literature appropriate to the level of that development. It is also designed to prepare the musician for performance at the advanced level. Musical, historical and theoretical concepts are discussed and applied appropriately to every piece of music. Marching band is a requirement (corequisite) for this course.

CONCERT BAND Class is designed to train the instrumental musician in proper rehearsal and performance techniques and to nurture their potential through the rehearsal and performance of quality wind band literature appropriate to the level of their development. It is also designed to prepare the musician for performance at a more advanced level. Musical, historical and theoretical concepts are discussed and applied appropriately to every piece of music. Marching band is strongly encouraged as a requirement for this course.

PERCUSSION ENSEMBLE Class is designed to train the percussionist in proper performance and rehearsal techniques as well as gain experience and expertise on the full array of percussion instruments utilized in the concert band setting. It is also designed to prepare the percussionist for performance at a more advanced level. Musical, historical and theoretical concepts are discussed and applied appropriately to every piece of music. Marching band is strongly encouraged as a requirement for this course.

JAZZ ENSEMBLE Class is designed to introduce and develop jazz performance through the rehearsal and performance of quality jazz literature. Jazz theory is studied as a basis for improvisation. Jazz performance techniques are developed through listening and imitation. Musical, historical and theoretical concepts are discussed and applied appropriately to every piece of music. Jazz Ensembles meet once a week after school for full credit (students may sign up for this class after the school year begins).

## II. Grading Plan:

Wind Ensemble, Symphonic Band, Concert Band, Percussion Ensemble and Jazz Ensemble are performance-based curricular classes. Because the performances connected to these classes are held outside of regular school hours, they are officially labeled "co-curricular" classes. Successful outcomes for students are based on the student's full participation in class, and his/her attendance and full participation at related events scheduled outside of the school day (this can include but is not limited to afterschool or evening rehearsals, dress rehearsals and the culminating performance activity).

## Conduct and Participation Guidelines and Expectations

A point scale will be used to determine grades for band.
Band class = 10 points

Maximum points can be earned by following proper attendance procedures, completing all class work, and fulfilling all student responsibilities.

## HOME PRACTICE:

Home practice is our "homework" for band! Every student will need varying amounts of home practice depending on their ability levels and the goals that they set for themselves. Home practice should be done in an effective and efficient manner. Remember that "slow practice makes fast progress."

Band sheet music should be practiced and learned at home (SmartMusic when applicable). Band rehearsals are not to be used to learn your sheet music. The purpose of rehearsal is to put together and refine the music that everyone has mastered outside of the rehearsal.

Home practice should include the following:

- Proper warm-up (long tones, lip slurs, etc.)
- Scale review
- Private lesson material
- Band sheet music


## 12 TIPS FOR BETTER PRACTICE:

1. Mark the music (pencil only)
2. Mark foot taps (up/down arrows) in measures with tricky rhythms
3. Mark accidentals that need to be carried through or flats/sharps in a hard key
4. Mark key changes and time changes
5. Mark articulations where needed
6. Mark dynamics
7. Set small reachable goals that can be attained in the time that you have available. Playing beginning to end every day is not a good use of practice time. Dissect and perfect!!
8. Practice shorter sections at a time and repeat, repeat, repeat for mastery.
9. Practice slowly for better mastery
10. Use a metronome
11. Don't leave the difficult parts for last. Learn them first.
12. If you have problems that you cannot solve on your own, ask your private teacher or the band director

All band students will be periodically tested on their assigned music and etudes. It may be required that a recording be made of these tests (responsibility of the student), or tested through Smart Music, in sectionals, class or in challenges.

## CHALLENGES:

Students may "challenge" the person one seat in front of them in the section for a higher seat. Students must inform the "challenge" and the director on the same day. Common time several classes later will be determined, and a blind challenge will be heard. The challenge will be based on current band music and will be chosen by the director. Students may also be required to play major scales and/or chromatic scale (District Band format required).

## PRIVATE LESSONS:

Students are strongly encouraged to seek private instruction from a qualified specialist on their instrument, if possible. Private individual lessons enable students to learn many of the specific technical skills that cannot be covered in the full band class, providing a greater challenge. Those students who are experiencing difficulties will improve their skills at a faster pace. There are many private instructors in our area, and the cost and length of lessons vary. A list of private instructors can be obtained from the director, found in the band room, or on Blackboard and/or band website.

BAND LETTER POINT CREDIT:
Students will have the opportunity to earn a letter utilizing the following system:
20 points $=$ Letter Letter+15 $=$ Pin Pin+15 $=$ Bar 30 points in 1 year $=$ Trophy
Students must complete an entire year in band to earn points. Points are cumulative. The point sheet is filed each year by the band director. Five (5) points will be subtracted for failure to attend concert performance for any reason.

## III. Rehearsal Etiquette

All members will be present in their seats or in "block" (marching band) at the designated time for rehearsal. This simple procedure involves each member arriving 10 minutes before the scheduled afterschool rehearsal time. They should assemble equipment and music, take their place in the rehearsal setup and perform their personal warm-up or work on "trouble spots" in the music to be rehearsed. During regular class, two (2) minutes will be allotted to assemble equipment, find their spot and go through their personal warm-up. All talking and warm-up should cease when the director steps on the podium. During the rehearsal you will be expected to give your undivided attention and cooperation to the director. When rehearsing of individual sections takes place, all other sections should sit quietly and listen to instructions being given to that section. Stops happen to advise individuals and sections on problems that are heard during the rehearsal. Unnecessary talking cuts down on the effectiveness of the rehearsal and it wastes all of our valuable time. Pencils are required at each rehearsal.

## PERCUSSION EXPECTATIONS

1. If you do not have a part to play during a band rehearsal, sit quietly out of the way of those that are playing.
2. Each item has a storage area and should be in that location when not in use.
3. Use the proper equipment for the proper instrument.
4. If something is broken or missing, advise the director immediately so that the problem can be fixed.
5. Big equipment can be left out after rehearsal - all other equipment is to be put away before leaving the band room.
6. Under no circumstances is any item of percussion equipment to be removed from the premises.

## IV. ATTENDANCE:

AFTER-SCHOOL REHEARSALS: Students and parents are reminded that band is a co-curricular class which means that attendance at after-school marching practices, sectionals, full band rehearsals and/or concerts is required and figured into the quarter grade. Musical information that is given to the students during the rehearsal cannot be made up (like a history lecture) because students have to hear the problem and
experience the solution in order for the rehearsal to be effective. Even one student missing from a rehearsal lowers the performance quality.

All members of performing groups will attend any extra rehearsals scheduled by the director. Conflicts with a rehearsal should be brought to the attention of the director at least 5 school days prior to the rehearsal in question. The director may or may not excuse the student's absence from the rehearsal. Students who do not attend required rehearsals and are unexcused may be placed on non-performance status and will have their quarter grade affected.

## PERFORMANCES

Absences from a performance are detrimental to any of the performing groups. Every effort and sacrifice should be made to be there because the entire band is counting on you! Attendance at performances is mandatory and is a factor in the student's quarter grade. Performance will include concerts, competitions and football games for marching band. Personal illness, death in the family, or family emergencies are the only excusable absences and these must be reviewed and excused by the director.

Students who have an excused absence from a performance will see the band director about an alternate assignment within one week of the concert date in order to receive a grade for that performance. Those with an unexcused absence will receive a zero for that performance grade and may be placed on non-performance status. Each student's participation affects the group outcome, and each student plays a valuable role in this process. It is imperative that we establish attendance guidelines that amplify this learning process for both the individual and the group. If a student is not in class, rehearsal or performance, he/she has missed the participatory portion of their educational experience, and that time is lost forever.

## UNEXCUSED ABSENCES ARE:

"Had to work"
"Couldn't get a ride"
"Didn't know about it"
"Forgot instrument, etc."
"Parents leaving town"
"I have homework"
"I have an appointment"
"Relatives visiting"
Other excuses

Be responsible. Make arrangements with your employer early. They must allow you time for school activities. We give you plenty of notice and there are 130+ other people counting on you.
Be responsible. Arrange this early. Get a carpool. Be responsible. Listen and read all information carefully. Be responsible. Show up anyway. Work it out. Be responsible. Make arrangements early. Communicate. Be responsible. So does everyone else. Uphold your commitment and learn to budget your time. Band rehearsal is your homework too!
Be responsible. Schedule these at a different time. You know these dates well in advance.
Be responsible. Explain your commitment to the band. They will respect that! Be responsible.

COMMUNICATION ABOUT ABSENCES: Communication is the student and parent's biggest asset. Students will be given plenty of advance notice about rehearsals and concerts, therefore it is expected that conflicts will be resolved beforehand. If the student is ill or there is a last minute emergency, the parent must e-mail or call the band office voicemail (703-802-5457) prior to the beginning of rehearsal. The student will then bring a parent-signed note to the director immediately upon the student's return to school. This includes if the student is absent from school. Be proactive. It is not the director's job to track down each student and find out why they are absent. Again, it is up to the director whether or not to excuse the absence.

## REHEARSALS

Remember! To be early is to be on time. All students are expected to be early for rehearsals in order to have adequate time for warm-up. For marching band or afterschool rehearsals, get there at least 10-15 minutes early! For the band classes, each student is expected to be in the room by the tardy bell and assembling their instrument. You will have 2 minutes to warm up and arrange the music for rehearsal.

There will be no disruptive behavior during rehearsal. Students found to be disrupting the learning environment will be removed from the rehearsal. Food, drinks, gum, or any other consumable items are not allowed in the rehearsal. Students will have their participation grade lowered and will be assigned after-school band room clean-up.

Students will have the appropriate materials for class to include:

- A sharpened pencil w/ an eraser
- All required sheet music/hand-outs/method books/chorales/etc.
- Instrument in good working condition (movable slides, etc.)
- Necessary accessories (See Equipment Expectations below)

Students will read that day's music line-up on the board and put all music and/or method books in order on the stand before the rehearsal begins.
Students should warm-up their instruments in a professional manner using lip slurs, scales and long tones. This is not an opportunity to socialize. Warm-up should cease when the director takes the podium.
Music should be prepared outside of rehearsal time. The purpose of rehearsal is to experience everyone else's parts and learn how yours fits in.
Remember: A poor rehearsal makes a poor performance and a great rehearsal ensures a great performance.

## V. FINANCIAL OBLIGATIONS:

All band students are required to pay band fees at the beginning of the year. All band fees are paid to the CVHS Wildcat Band Boosters (WBB) [put your child's name in the memo] and are non-refundable. Note that all parents/guardians are automatically members of the CVHS WBB at no additional cost.

Fees can be offset by fundraising credits earned throughout the year. In addition, the Band Boosters can provide some financial assistance if a student would otherwise be unable to participate in band. Application for this assistance is confidential and should be made directly to Mrs. Hall (Melissa.Hall3@fcps.edu) as soon as possible.
Assistance needs will be discussed on a case-by-case basis.

- Marching Band Fee - \$335

The fee associated with marching band covers band camp instruction, drill writing, marching music, pep music, equipment, competition fees, charter bus fees, marching band uniform maintenance and 6 marching band home game dinners. In addition, it covers all fees included in the general band fee.

- Color Guard Fee - \$175

The fee associated with color guard covers band camp instruction, drill writing, color guard routine writing, equipment, competition fees, charter bus fees, color guard uniform and 6 marching band home game dinners.

# ****COLOR GUARD STUDENTS WHO ARE ALSO IN BAND DURING THE SCHOOL YEAR PAY THE \$335 FEE**** 

- General Band Fee (for students not in marching band) - \$135.00 The fee associated with general band covers general band expenses, such as music, clinicians, venue fees, etc. This fee is paid by every student in the CVHS Band program (already included in Marching Band Fee)
- Additional band fees not included at this time may be: marching shoes, socks, gloves, CVHS Spirit Wear, tuxedo shirts (for concert season) - many can be purchased through the WBB; more details to follow. Concert season band fees may include instrument rental fees, spring trip fee (approx. \$500-\$800 per trip) and meal expenses.


## GENERAL BAND FEE TOTAL = \$135.00 for the 2014-2015 school year and can be broken into two payments (due 9/26/14 and 10/24/14)

## FUNDRAISING

The band is sensitive to the financial burden band involves. We think it is a worthwhile investment. We offer several ways that you can earn you money and NEVER pay out of pocket one dime! Please take advantage of all of our fund raising projects as they help you and the band program (more information to follow). In addition, there are several full band fund raisers throughout the year. The first is TAG DAY on SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 27 ${ }^{\text {th }}$, 2014. It is a class expectation that all families participate in fundraising at the minimum level.

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE and workable payment schedules are available for students who are unable to meet the above financial commitment as long as the student participates in fundraising activities. THE CENTREVILLE HIGH SCHOOL WILDCAT BAND BOOSTERS AND THE BAND DIRECTOR ARE COMMITED TO ALLOWING EVERY STUDENT TO PARTICIPATE IN BAND, REGARDLESS OF THEIR FINANCIAL STATUS. To arrange for a plan, parents/guardians should contact the WBB Treasurer, Mark (treasurer@cvhsband.org) or the Band Director. Information will be kept confidential.

All fees are subject to change after review and approval by the Band Board.

## VI. Uniform Information

Band students at Centreville High School represent the entire school and community when performing at games, concerts and festivals. The overall appearance of our Band members communicates the level of pride that we take in our program, school and community. It is crucial that uniforms for all ensembles reflect this pride. When in uniform, the student/musician is expected to wear the uniform in an appropriate manner, i.e. shirts need to be tucked in and sleeves not rolled up, hats on the head in proper manner, facing front, etc.

Marching and Concert Uniforms are the property of Centreville High School and are NOT to be taken home for any reason, unless given prior permission.

- Rental fees for use of the marching uniforms must be paid and are included in the marching band fee
- Marching uniforms will be issued during Band Camp.
- Each uniform consists of: 1 pair of pants, 1 jacket, 1 sash, 1 hat with a plume and hatbox, and 1 pair of white marching band gloves, all of which are provided to you by the band. You are responsible for purchasing 1 pair of black marching shoes, and 1 pair of black socks (must come to at least the calf). We will order the marching band shoes for you when we measure you for uniforms. You buy the socks on your own.
- Marching shoes will be ordered during Band Camp at a cost of approximately $\$ 27.00$ (not covered by the band fee.)
- Marching uniforms are kept in the Uniform Room on racks; each student has an assigned "spot" to keep his or her uniform.
- Each student is expected to hang up his or her uniform, in its proper place, after each home game and competition.
- Each student must wear socks that come to at least the calf. Any student who is not wearing proper socks will be issued socks at a fee of $\$ 3$ per occurrence.


## CONCERT UNIFORMS

- Concert uniforms will be issued during fall rehearsals after school starts.
- Each uniform consists of: (BOYS) 1 pair of tuxedo pants, 1 tuxedo jacket, 1 bowtie, (GIRLS) 1 dress, 1 pearl necklace.
- Concert uniforms are kept in the Uniform Room on racks; each student has an assigned "spot" to keep his or her uniform.
- Students will be responsible for their uniforms and returning all parts of that uniform after each performance.
- Gentlemen are required to wear black dress shoes and black socks that come to at least the calf with their concert uniforms.
- Ladies are required to wear black closed-toe dress shoes with off-black hose.

Gentlemen are required to purchase their own wing-tip tuxedo shirt to use during concert season. Make sure your old shirt still fits well in advance of the first performance!

## VII. Wildcat Band Boosters (WBB)

The WBB is made up of all parents of students in the Band and Color Guard. Due to the budget cuts that the Fine Arts programs in Fairfax County Schools have undergone, the WBB must meet the challenge of raising funds to support and maintain the band programs' high standards. This funding provides for the design and choreographing of the marching show and the purchase of new instruments, uniforms, equipment, and music. It also covers the cost of transportation to events and pays for specialists who assist in teaching band and guard members. The WBB is led by a Board of Directors, which serves as the administrative arm of the association. The WBB meets monthly throughout the year ( $2^{\text {nd }}$ Tuesday of each month, $7: 15 \mathrm{PM}$ in the CVHS Bandroom). The meetings are open to all members of the WBB. The WBB conducts numerous fund raising activities that require parent and student participation. These include: sale of CVHS Band spirit wear, car washes, Scrip sales, Citrus sales and more. Please watch for information on these events and learn how you can help.

## VIII. Audition Information

Auditions will take place in October for chair placement and in April for Band placement for the following school year. All students (except graduating seniors in April) will go through the audition process as described below:

## REQUIREMENTS

- Major Scales (20 points): Students will know all major scales and will perform selected scales, legato tongue up and down, in quarter note/eighth note pattern at $\mathrm{mm}=100$ in as many octaves as possible: C F Bb Eb Ab Db/C\# Gb/F\# Cb/B E A D G
- Chromatic Scale (20 points): Students will perform their chromatic in the full range of the instrument, as fast as possible, using slur-up/tongue-down articulation.
- Prepared Piece ( $\mathbf{3 0}$ points): Each student will perform a prepared selection.
- Sight-Reading ( $\mathbf{3 0}$ points): Each student will perform a sight-reading excerpt which will be chosen by the director.


## PERCUSSION REQUIREMENTS:

- Snare - Rudiments: each to be performed open/closed/open, prepared, sight-reading
- Mallets - Scales and Chromatic, prepared and sight-reading
- Timpani Tuning and sight-reading


## GENERAL AUDITION INFORMATION:

- Don't wait until the last minute to begin working on your prepared piece.
- If you have a conflict (as approved by the director) it must be cleared ahead of time. No-shows will not get another chance to audition unless excused.
- October auditions will be done blind, April auditions will be done in person
- Use of scale sheets or fingering charts, talking during the auditions or arriving late may result in disqualification.
- Talking is not allowed during the auditions!


## XI. Equipment Information

## GENERAL INFORMATION:

All instruments should be brought to class in good working condition. That means tuning slides are movable and valves or keys are not sticking or leaking. Brass and Woodwind players need to provide good reeds and mouthpieces and any accessories (mutes) that are necessary to perform the music.

All instruments will be kept in their assigned locker. Any instruments found left out will be confiscated and the student must pay a $\$ 1.00$ fine to retrieve them. Students are responsible for paying a lock rental fee each year.

No student shall touch another student's instrument at any time or for any reason. Percussion instruments are off-limits to all band members with the exception of percussionists.

## SCHOOL-OWNED INSTRUMENTS:

Each student using a county-owned instrument must pay the required rental fee and turn in the rental contract. This includes percussionists. If your FCPS instrument is in need of repair you should tell the director immediately. County-owned instruments will be sent out by the director for repairs if needed. Any damage due to neglect or horseplay will be paid for by the student. Students renting a county-owned instrument are not allowed to let anyone else play them. You are responsible for this instrument.

## PERSONAL-OWNED INSTRUMENTS:

If a personal instrument is taken in for repair, the student must bring in a parent-signed note along with the repair slip to be excused without an instrument. If the instrument will be in the shop for a long time, it is recommended that you ask for a loaner.
It is highly recommended that parents put instruments on your home-owners insurance. Make sure that you have the Instrument name (ex. Clarinet), Make, Model and serial number plus notate any accessories in the case as well.

PERCUSSION: Every percussionist must pay the $\$ 52$ FCPS percussion fee payable to Centreville High School. Percussionists should have the following:
Mallet bag
General snare sticks
Marimba mallets (yarn)
Timpani mallets (generals)
Snare pad
Note: Make sure all mallets, sticks and bags are labeled with your name in permanent marker
BRASS - Cleaning cloth, valve, rotary oil or slide grease, appropriate mouthpieces for the high school level (Trumpets: 7 C is a beginner mouthpiece. It is time to go to a bigger one $-5 C, 3 C$, etc. ), a straight mute.

## CVHS Band Agreement

PAYMENTS REQUIRED: We understand that the CVHS Band Program will begin with Marching Band Camp in August, by which time marching students must have fulfilled the marching band payment to cover the cost as explained in the marching band packet. ## Instrument Storage Locker Contract

- Materials for class (ex. Instrument, music, pencil, sheet music or other)


## FAQ's

1. How do I turn in money? Any trip payments, forms, etc. should be placed in "The Black Box" in the band room. Any money should be in an envelope with your name, date and what it is for on the front. Please do not put forms in the envelope.
2. What if I become ill and cannot make a rehearsal? Contact the band director (703-802-5457 or mahall3@fcps.edu) before the rehearsal begins. Do not have another student relay the message - do it yourself. Bring a parent signed note the next day. You should never, ever just not show up regardless of the reason!! Remember that we are counting on you!
3. What if I am out of school and there is an after-school or night rehearsal on that day? Am I automatically excused? No. You should make every effort to be there. If you are feeling okay, come to the rehearsal. If not, re-read FAQ \#2.
4. What if I find that I have a conflict with a scheduled performance? You have all performance dates well in advance. Any conflicts should be communicated to the band director well in advance as well. See Band Handbook for specifics.
5. What if I forget my instrument or music for class? Be honest and tell Mrs. Hall before class starts and take your grade deduction. If you don't, and are discovered later, the consequence could be a double grade deduction as an Honor Code violation.
6. What if my instrument is in need of repair? If it is a school-owned instrument, bring it to Mrs. Hall immediately and she will send it out for repair. If it is your own, take it to a recommended repair person ASAP. You must have a parent-signed note or a repair ticket in order to be excused.
7. What if I lose my music? Don't lose your music!
8. What if I leave my instrument out? Don't leave your instrument out! (you will have to pay a $\$ 1.00$ fine to reclaim it)
9. What is the consequence if I have gum or food in the band room? Grade deduction and you will stay after class/school for Band room clean-up.
10. Does my conduct in class affect my grade? Yes, because it is a performance class and your actions can prevent you and others around you from learning.

## Technology statement:

Cell phones, iPods, electronic game devices, etc. have no place in the band rehearsal or performance for a performer or a listener. They will be confiscated. Any electronic device found to be used at times other than designated by the band director WILL be confiscated and sent to the students' sub-school, where CVHS disciplinary action will apply.

Facebook, Twitter, etc. are popular methods of communication in society today. Remember that anything you say or post to a social media site becomes public knowledge and can be hurfful to others. Any use of social media for the purpose of making negative comments about other students will be considered "cyber-bullying" and will be dealt with by the administration. Membership in the Wildcat Band family is an honor and a privilege. Any negative comments about the band program and its endeavors on social media are highly discouraged. If you have a question or a concern about the band, it is desirable to go directly to the band director.
