# **Course Description**

Concert Choir is a non-audition vocal ensemble. Students focus on the fundamentals of vocal technique, sight-singing, music theory, and music history; perform a diverse repertoire of choral literature; and participate in public performances.

# **Course Objectives**

- 2. Develop each individual singer's vocal technique
- 3. Promote ensemble singing techniques
- 3. Perform choral repertoire for the school and community.
- 4. Demonstrate proper concert etiquette as a student and performer.
- 5. Cultivate a life-long love for making music.

#### **Concert Participation**

Electing to participate in a performing group includes consistent attendance for class, extra rehearsals, and performances. An absence of any one person affects the entire group's performance. Concert performance dates are given well in advance of the event. Students are also expected to arrive on time for concerts. Call times are given in advance, so students can plan accordingly.

# **Sight-Singing Portion**
